1.0 Abstract

This project is to discover information relating to the reported wreck of the schooner *SV Jane Ellen* for which there is a report (MADU Ref. 238) of it having gone aground on 14 October 1881 at Abererch, Caernarfonshire, Wales. The home port was given as Porthmadog (Fig. 1).

The Coflein report gives the *SV Jane Ellen* aground at Abersoch on 21st March 1887 and became a total loss.

The objective is to establish the facts relating to the wreck report and discover the circumstances leading up to the grounding and the outcome, together with any other relevant information.

The research is limited to information available on-line as access to libraries and record offices was not possible at this time due to the lockdown for the CORVID-19 pandemic.

3.0 Introduction

This wreck is listed as one of five vessels driven aground on 14th October 1881 at Abererch. It seemed logical to examine the circumstances of all five and prepare a report for each. I hoped to discover information which would answer the following questions:

- What were the vessel's specifications?
- What historical information is available relating to the vessel?
- What was the story leading up to wrecking?
- What caused the wrecking?
- What has happened since the wrecking?
- Has anyone previously investigated or researched the vessel back story?
- Has anyone dived, recorded, surveyed or worked on the site?
- Has any salvage, etc. been carried out?
- Have there been any previous reports produced relating to the vessel?


4.0 Background

Prior to starting this research the only knowledge of the vessel and wreck was that given in the MADU data-base (Fig.2).

5.0 Research Methodology

The following were used in this research:-

Acer Laptop with fast fibre wireless internet connection, I-phone. Search engines used were Google Chrome AVG Secure Browser Microsoft Office Windows 10 Snip & Sketch

Methodology: first step to check out Coflein, but nothing there relating to this 'wreck' at Abersoch.

Then Lloyds Register. Porthmadog archive. Newspaper records. Crewlist.

6.0 Results

The site of the beaching is given as Abererch referring to the sands about 1 mile East of Pwllheli at the North of Cardigan Bay

• The SV Jane Ellen specification,

Built at Portmadoc (original spelling) 1863. Known to be a two-masted trading Schooner (top sail) intended primarily for the slate trade.





Figure 6, Extract from Appropriation book

Official number 44250. (Fig.6) 76Tons.

Builders dimensions: keel length 66ft 10ins, Beam 18ft 11/2ins, depth of hold 9ft 41/2ins. Lloyds measurements are Length 72ft 5ins, Beam 18ft 5ins, depth 9ft 2ins. For further information see Appendix A.

Background information,

The builder was Mr Wm. Griffith from Borth, who built the ship at Portmadoc, for Wm Lloyd of Portmadoc who had a Ship Chandlery and a Drapers business there. The ship was described as being 'an exceedingly neat and well-built vessel and for its size fully equals in every respect, any other ship which has hitherto been built in Portmadoc.'(Fig. 5). There is almost a hint in this description that this might have been the first ship built by Wm Griffith at Portmadoc. I could not find any reference to him or the *SV Jane Ellen* in the Portmadoc records that are available on-line. The ship was intended for the local slate trade.

The Master Captain Owen Jones and the Owner Wm Lloyd seemed satisfied with the ship as they continued to operate it until at least 1873 and then with Master J Owens until 1880.

For a straightforward name the vessel has been confusingly misnamed during its life Viz. At the launch it was referred to, in the report (Fig. 5), as the Jane Ellin named by the owner with respect to his daughter. Now Elin is the Welsh equivalent of Ellen which is short for Helene which is interpreted as beauty or stylish and the Welsh Elin means strong and productive. The owner Wm. Lloyd had two daughters Mary and Jane Ellen he clearly intended the Schooner to be named after Jane Ellen.

In the Official number Appropriation record it is listed as *Jane Ellen*The Mercantile Navy List of 1863 lists the vessel as the *Jane Ellen* of Carnarvon (Fig. 7).

The first appearance in the Lloyds Register is in 1865 (Appendix B) where the vessel No 44250 is listed as Jane Ellin and continued to be so referred until 1872 when Ellin is manually crossed out and Ellen typed in.

Historical Information,

I have discovered the following historical information relating to the *SV Jane Ellen*, The *SV Jane Ellen* traded mostly around the Irish Sea and Bristol Channel carrying slate from Portmadoc and coal (on return passage). Generally incident free. There was a lifeboat service in 1867 to a 'Jane Ellen' but I believe that this was to an Aberystwyth based 35 Ton schooner.

• **Lead up to wrecking**, All we know is that the SV Jane Ellen was on passage from Pwllheli to Caernarfon and ran ashore at Abersoch (Fig. 8 Coflein report).

Site Description Archaeological remains associated with the loss of this vessel are not confirmed as present at this location, but may be in the vicinity.

Event and Historical Information: The JANE ELLEN was a 76nt wooden schooner built in 1863. At time of loss on 21 March 1887, the vessel was owned by J Evans of Abererch (also the master). The vessel was on passage from Pwllheli to Caernarfon when it ran ashore at Abersoch in an east-south-easterly force 5.



• Cause of the wrecking, Strong on-shore wind and poor navigation.

- Since the wrecking the ship was sold and dismantled.
- Previous investigation or research of this vessel,
 The only previously documented information is that which is contained in the data bases.
- The Site,
 As an aground wreck site there is nothing to record by diving or surveying at the site.
- Additional Information,
 With research limited to on-line at the present time I have not been able to discover a copy of the builder's original plans or any photographs or drawings.
 However I was very grateful to receive information from Deborah (Jones) Krisko, featuring the painting reproduced on the front cover of this report and the image and pictures at Picture 2, page 12.

Events encountered during the vessel's lifetime,

Information given in the MADU data base and R Cadwalader data base and also in Henry Parry 'Wreck and Rescue on the Coast of Wales' record a beaching of the vessel on Abererch sands on the morning of the great storm of Oct 14th 1881. Ivor Wynne Jones in 'Shipwrecks of North Wales' Ed 3 1986 includes the SV Jane Ellen in his wreck map and Index but with no text indeed he has no reference to the 1881 storm or the many wrecks resulting. There is some debate as to whether this information confuses the SV Jane Ellen with the SV John Ellis which was the vessel beached at Abererch (along with four other ships) according to contemporary local newspaper (Appendix D). It has been suggested that this account naming the SV John Ellis, Master Captain Willoughby of Portmadoc, is a misprint for the SV Jane Ellen. Unfortunately the Lloyds Register 1883 to 1889 are not available to verify this information, but the Mercantile Navy lists for the period list a Schooner John Ellis No 17363, 99 Tons, registered at Carnarvon, home port Portmadoc owned by John Ellis of Ralph Tar, Borth, Carnarvonshire. As this vessel was on passage to Copenhagen from Portmadoc it seems to me that the contemporary newspaper record is accurate and there is no reference in the newspaper reports to the SV Jane Ellen.

Passengers and crew,

The *SV Jane Ellen* did not normally carry any passengers, her typical crew would comprise The Master, Mate, two Seamen, a Cook and a Boy.

Owners and Masters,

Mr R Cadwalader has provided an extract from 'Porthmadog Ships' (Fig 10). This states in the second part that the SV Jane Ellen had nine owners including Owen Jones, the master. We do know that the owner at the wrecking 21st March 1887 was listed by Coflein as J Evans of Abererch who was also the Master (Fig. 8). It seems unlikely to me that the vessel changed hands seven times between 1881 and 1886. I believe that confusion has arisen due to Wm Lloyd Company having several shareholders (both family and others) and having shares in several ships during the period one of whom may well have been Captain Owen Jones following his retirement as Master.

I believe therefore that the *SV Jane Ellen* (44250) only had one owner. I could conjecture that if this vessel was indeed aground at Abererch (1881) and slightly damaged it could have prompted a sale to Captain J Evans of Abererch. Unfortunately the Lloyds Registers are not available for this period. I believe that Captain Owen Jones retired sometime in 1873 being replaced by Captain J Owens. In 1887 The Master was J Evans (of Abererch). I believe Wm Lloyd Co. remained the owners whilst J Evans was probably a shareholder.

The first part of the extract (Fig 10) refers to the vessel being lost in an explosion in the Thames. I believe that this is totally at odds with other evidence e.g. Coflein, and should be discounted. Interesting though that this account has J Evans as Master and Wm Lloyd Co. as owners.

7.0 Analysis

I believe that the conclusions arrived at are accurate and the only information that I could discover that in some way match the basic information provided in the data bases. My concerns relate to the discrepancy between my conclusions and the data base viz,

The date: given as 14^{th} Oct 1881 refers to the Beaching at Abererch the actual wrecking of this vessel occurred on 21^{st} March 1887.

The vessel: given as 'Jane Ellen' – I have remarked on the possibility that in the incident at Abererch the vessel may have been as reported the *SV John Ellis*.

Wrecked: given as wrecked in MADU (Fig. 2) and in R Cadwalader (Fig. 3). Whichever vessel it actually was, it was driven onto the beach in the storm, but although very likely slightly damaged was re-floated and continued in service.

I was surprised that I could not find any local or newspaper reference to the 1887 wrecking of this local vessel.

8.0 Conclusions & Recommendations

I have probably spent approximately 25 hours on this project including about 14 hours on-line.

My account conflicts to some extent with the basic facts set out in the data bases but I believe that I have developed the most plausible account.

I do not believe that there is scope for any further development of this incident.

The eventual wreck of the vessel is documented in Coflein and all the dates coincide.







News W Cite Share THE STORM. I Since the terrible gale, known in this part of the country as the Royal Charter gale there has not I be so severe a storm on the Welsh coast as was experienced last Friday and the preceding Thursday night. Induration it was more prolonged than that storm in which the large steamship and its living freight were lost. The wind began to freshen on Thursday evening from the south-south-east, and, increasing in force, veered to the south-south-west between ten and eleven, at which time it was blowing a gale. The storm continued with increased violence ,utitil three o'clock on Friday afternoon, when rain began to fall, and the wind, which was then blowing almost due west, to abate. It is calculated by Professor Stone, of the

News W Cite Share PWLLHELI. A most terrific storm has prevailed here from about midnight on Thursday last week. It is feared that great destruction has been done to property, both on land and sea. A large stack of hay belonging to Mr. Owen Owens, coal merchant, of this town, was whirled away and scattered before the wind. Several signal posts on the Cambrian Railways have been blown down. House tops and chimney pots have been also blown off in several of the adjacent neighbourhoods. About six a.m. on Friday, the schooner Dreadnought, Captain Bogan, laden with pitwood, from Cork for Barrow, parted her cables at St. Tudwell's Roads, and was driven ashore at Abererch beach, near this town. The crew were all saved by means of ropes attached from the shore to the rigging. The surf is making a clean sweep over the vessel, and she will be greatly damaged, if not a total wreck. The schooner Amlwch Packet, Captain Williams, with coals, from Bristol Channel for Port Nant, is also ashore here, having drifted before the wind from the roads; crew saved. The Harkaway, from Beaumaris, met with a similar fate, as did also the schooner John Ellis, Captain Willoughby, from Portmadoc for Copenhagen crew saved. The brig St. George, for Aberdovey, laden with deals, is also ashore crew saved.
